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## Bureaucracy: To hold back the 'Rein of Arabian Horse of Development'

EIN and bridle are two synonymous words, the meaning of which is the same or similar. Rein is a long narrow band of leather that is used to fence around a horse's head in order to control it. Sometimes necessity is also the mother of invention. In addition to the individual's ambition and attitude in the bureaucratic world, necessity sometimes becomes a mother of corruption. In many developing countries, quite a few bureaucrats are satisfied with what they have on their own.
